### **Pupil Premium Strategy Academic Year 2023-2024**

### **Background to the Pupil Premium Grant (PPG)**

The Pupil Premium is allocated to children from low-income families who are currently, or have recently been, known to be eligible for Free School Meals (FSM), and children whose parents are in the armed forces and children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months. This group of pupils are termed 'disadvantaged' by OFSTED. The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address what it perceives to be underlying inequalities and ensure funding reaches the pupils who need it most. It is for school to decide how the Pupil Premium, allocated to schools per FSM pupil, is spent, "since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility." (DFE 2012). The funding for the Pupil Premium is allocated per financial year with 'top-ups' being given during the course of the year. The provision for our Pupil Premium children is managed on a termly basis through our Achievement & Standards Committee. The committee will meet to review the strategy on 17<sup>th</sup> October 2023, 30th January 2024 and 14<sup>th</sup> May 2024.

In 2023-24, the level of the premium is £1,455 per child. The total amount of Pupil Premium funding for this period was £90,210. This figure is based on 62 children. There is an additional £12,650 allocated to 5 children who are post LAC. In total the Pupil Premium funding is £102,860. The school intends to allocate funding for the next financial year by:-

#### **Barriers to Learning**

- Children often start Reception below age related expectations in Literacy, Maths and Communication
- There are an increasing number of children who have additional needs when they start Nursery and Reception (such as health, communication needs)
- An increasing number of our younger children struggle to communicate effectively due to speech and language needs
- An increasing number of our children have very limited English
- Some of our families have difficulties getting their children to school on time.
- Some of our families are involved with a number of other agencies including Social Services, Health Services, Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service.
- Some of our children struggle with emotional and social difficulties often linked to issues affecting the family such as: The pandemic, domestic violence, alcohol and substance misuse, loss of a parent, family debt and poor home conditions

We recognise that not all pupils who receive pupil premium funding are socially disadvantaged. We also recognise that not all pupils that are socially disadvantaged are registered for or qualify for free school meals. We allocate the Pupil Premium Grant to support any pupils who are eligible, along with those the school has identified as being socially disadvantaged.
