Homework Policy September 2022 Miss J Whalley



Rationale

Homework is an important part of a child's education. Children benefit greatly from the mutual support of parents and teachers in encouraging them to learn both at home and at school. One of the aims of our school is for children to develop as independent learners. We believe that homework is one of the main ways in which children can acquire the skill of independent learning.

Aims

- To enable pupils to make maximum progress in their academic and social development
- To help pupils develop the skills of an independent learner
- To promote a partnership between home and school in supporting each child's learning
- To consolidate and reinforce learning done in school and to allow children to practice skills taught in lessons
- To help children to develop good work habits for the future
- To extend school learning, for example, through additional reading

The role of parents

Parents have a vital role to play in their child's education, and homework is an important part of this process. We ask parents to ensure that their child completes the homework tasks that are set. We invite them to help their children as they feel necessary and provide them with the sort of environment that allows children to do their best. Parents can support their children by providing a good working space at home, by enabling their child to visit the library regularly, and by discussing the work that their child is doing.

Various support is available for parents – booklets, website, 1:1 with teachers, parent presentations, etc.

Sanctions

We expect that children will complete homework set and return it on the specified day. Parents will be informed if homework is consistently missed. In Upper Key Stage 2, children will be asked to complete homework at break times if it is consistently not completed. This is part of preparation for their next stage of learning (at high school) where detentions will be administered should students not return homework.

Monitoring

It is the responsibility of the Deputy Headteacher to ensure the policy is effective. The policy will be reviewed biannually in conjunction with class teachers, comments from parental surveys and Government recommendations.

Appendix 1 outlines the school's schedule for setting and assessing homework. We increase the amount of homework for children as they move through the school.

For parents who would like more homework, packs are available on request from the class teacher and these include lists of relevant websites. Please note that teachers cannot commit to marking additional, voluntary homework of this kind.
